her love of open spaces and the natural world. She and her husband, Halvor Garos, spent weekends visiting the area south of Madison, and eventually came to purchase property in the Town of Dunn. The farm later became the site for her practice, and in 1968 they made this their permanent home.

In 1984 Dr. Watts retired from her practice and focused upon the preservation of her beloved springs and wetlands. Her quest led her in 1986 to place a conservation easement on her entire property, which is held by the American Farmland Trust and DCNHF. The easement ensures the protection of the open farmland and the preservation of the woods and wetlands in accordance with Dr. Watt's wishes.

The Foundation is grateful to Dr. Watts for this bequest and has established a committee to created long-range plan for the property.

Protecting Your Land - Part 1

Ensuring that the conservation values of your property are protected is one of the most important ways individuals can contribute to the natural heritage of Dane County. This two-part article explains how land trusts can help private landowners to meet their conservation goals. Part two will be printed in an upcoming issue. If you would like to protect your land, while also retaining ownership of your property, land trusts can provide several options.


Conservation Easements - A conservation easement is a legal agreement between the landowner(s) and a land trust that permanently limits the uses of land in order to protect its conservation values. In donating a conservation easement to a land trust such as DCNHF, you permanently give up some rights associated with land, such as subdividing the property, while retaining others, such as growing crops. DCNHF's conservation director drafts the easement in consultation with the landowners, taking into account unique features of the property.

Conservation easements are written up in an agreement that outlines the rights of the landowner and the restrictions placed upon the property. These restrictions are conveyed with the title when the land is sold or passed on to heirs, and it is the job of the land trust to make sure the terms of the easement are followed.

An easement often requires an endowment to help defray the costs of monitoring the property for violations and the possibility of defending the easement against a legal challenge in the future. Other costs to the landowner can include having their own attorney review the easement document and having an appraisal done of the property. Conservation easements, though, can provide important tax benefits and relieve the burden of estate taxes that often make it difficult for heirs to keep the land intact. (continued on page 3)

Registry Program - Including your property as part of a registry program is another way to protect your land while retaining ownership. Within a registry program the conservation values of a property are recognized and through a handshake agreement the landowner promises to protect the land. The agreement is informal and may be ended at any

Unique Partnership Working to Protect Greene Prairie

Regarded as one of the premiere restoration sites in the country, Greene Prairie, on the Grady Tract of the UW-Arboretum south of the beltline, has become threatened by mounting pressure to develop a neighboring parcel of land. It is estimated that silt from nearby construction already covers one-fifth of the prairie. Development on the Sprague Dawley property, which lies along the southern edge of the Arboretum and drains directly into the prairie, would cause severe damage to the area's fragile ecology.

Recognizing this threat, DCNHF has facilitated the efforts of a consortium of groups committed to supporting the purchase of 50 acres of this land by Dane County Parks for a conservancy area. In addition to raising money for the outright purchase, the consortium has created plans to both address the current drainage problem and to reduce the damage if a partial development of the Sprague-Dawley property moves forward. Over the next few months the consortium is hoping this hard work will pay off with the preservation of the beauty and solitude found by visitors to Greene Prairie.
