Prairie Partners Interns: Boots on the Ground

2023 marks the 12th year of the Prairie Partners internship program! Oh, how time flies when you're outside all summer sweating and getting eaten alive by insects (and doing important conservation work all the while). Once again, Groundswell has partnered with Madison Audubon Society, Friends of Pheasant Branch Conservancy, Friends of Lakeshore Nature Preserve, and Friends of Cherokee Marsh to employ interns to restore local land. But the program is about a lot more than just land work. These paid internships also give students the chance to learn about land management practices, gain hands-on work experience, and give back to their communities.

From May to August each year, our five undergraduate interns are in the field working hard. They lace up their boots, put on their work gloves, and spend each day restoring land at a different partner's site. When working on Groundswell sites, the crew alternates Mondays at Westport Prairie and Patrick Marsh. While the work activities change throughout the season, the mission to remove invasive plants stays the same. Tasks include pulling garlic mustard and sweet clover, digging up wild parsnip, and cutting back aggressive trees and shrubs like buckthorn and honeysuckle.

Good News for the Wisconsin River Valley

Protecting special places forever is always a team effort. We recently had the pleasure of teaming up with The Prairie Enthusiasts, along with two conservation-minded landowners, to help protect 40 acres of land in the Wisconsin River Valley.

When Wisconsinites think of their landscapes, they rarely envision sandy areas where cacti could thrive. So, it may be surprising to learn that within the Wisconsin River Valley, such an ecosystem has survived the changes of the last century and is now permanently protected by The Prairie Enthusiasts.

With the help of Groundswell, this 40-acre parcel, now named Giordano Oak Barrens and Sand Prairie, was donated to The Prairie Enthusiasts by Ron and Darla Giordano on May 16, 2023. Groundswell led negotiations with the owners, made arrangements for and helped cover costs associated with the closing. With help, in part, from a generous donation provided by the Giordanos to support initial management of the site, The Prairie Enthusiasts can now ensure the continued vitality of this area.

The Giordanos took an interest in the area many years ago. For ten years, they called the original owner twice a year, asking if he was interested in selling. When the day finally came, the original owner asked to meet the Giordanos to ensure they were people

who would care for the land. Satisfied with the Giordanos' intent, he sold them the property, and they quickly began making improvements.

They contacted the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to survey the land and understand its history. They planted trees and removed dead brush. Their stewardship was driven by their goal for the land to be a haven for the natural world and for others to enjoy its splendor.

The property has a beautiful view

overlooking Lake Wisconsin and the Merrimac Railroad Bridge. It also has various native ecosystems that were once common but are now rare.

We are grateful to the Giordanos, The Prairie Enthusiasts, and the many volunteers who helped protect this property for generations to come. Current and new volunteers will now work to bring the ecosystem back to sand prairie and oak barrens, its original condition when the Ho Chunk Nation was caring for the land for thousands of years.



The Town of Dunkirk is a **Special Place**

With its rich farm soils and miles of Yahara riverbank, the Town of Dunkirk is a special place. That's why we're partnering with Dunkirk to protect the rural character of the Town. Located southeast of the City of Stoughton, Town of Dunkirk residents voted to protect the Town's rural character through a Purchase of Development Rights program. This program, funded by a tax on residents in the Town, helps purchase development rights to keep farmland farmland and open spaces open. Each purchase protects the property with a conservation easement.

Groundswell and the Town are evaluating potential projects as they arise. Groundswell will help raise additional funds and complete land deals. As properties are protected, the Town and Groundswell will work together to monitor them annually. Groundswell is excited to build a new partnership with the Town of Dunkirk.
